If you type a partial address, Bing fills in and reveals the zip code. Just like with a postcode, you can use a search engine to find an area code by searching for the city and state you're looking for, followed by the area code of the words. You'll usually find what you need. For international listings, search for an expression, would be Kenya's calling code, and you'll get an informative response with the numbers you'll need to make a call in that nation. Enter your city and status in a new Bing search and you'll see more than likely Google-like results showing you the area code top of the results. The same applies to international calling codes.
